

From the Pastor's Desk



I am writing this from Lauderdale By The Sea, Florida. My husband Dan and I, our daughter Elizabeth, and her husband Shane are staying in a duplex three blocks from the ocean. We are disappointed in the condition of the duplex. The neighbors continually play their music way too loud. If that were not enough, it has been cloudy, windy and sprinkle-y the two days we have been here so far. The next two days are supposed to be rainy. After that, the sun is forecasted to come out, but it is supposed to be cooler. There may not be a single day that is beach-worthy. It would be

easy to complain – and it sounds like I am. We save all year for our South Florida vacation, and this week's weather is not typical, sunny, South Florida weather.

That seems to be our human condition, doesn't it? It seems that we are eager to complain, and we complain a lot. We are not as eager to be grateful for our blessings.

This duplex we are staying at is on a canal of the Intracoastal Waterway. When we walk out of the patio door, there is a small patio, a small in-ground pool, and then the canal. It is as though we are at the end of a river. It is beautiful in the daytime. It is stunning at night, when the lights reflect off the water. The kids are having a blast fishing. The small back yard is surrounded by palm trees and tropical plants. We may not be having typical South Florida beach weather, but we are experiencing wonderful blessings. I am very grateful!

I have caught myself several times with an attitude of complaint the past two days. It made me think about the times when I am quick to complain and slow to be grateful. I am wondering if this happens to you as well.

Today I read and reflected on the entire book of James. It is a good writing on what it means to act like a follower of Jesus. Of course, James tells us not to complain. He also tells us to be grateful. Both are actually common themes throughout the Bible.

If I am not home by the time you read this, I will be within the next few days. It will seem easy for all of us to complain about ice and snow and cold weather. It will seem easy to complain about the dark of winter. Aches and pains seem worse in the winter. And now with Covid numbers up again, it is another thing to complain about. But instead of complaining, let's see if we can come up with ways to express gratitude for God's blessings. I will be interested in hearing your gratitude for blessings when you could have been complaining.

Adult Mission Trip Details

Our annual Adult Mission trip to Midwest Mission Distribution Center (MMDC) in Springfield, Illinois, is scheduled for Mar. 30 – Apr. 1, 2022. A signup sheet is included in this issue. The MMDC staff is fully vaccinated, and Covid protocols are in place. Masks must be worn in the kit room and warehouses at all times. If you need to remove your mask for any reason, you need to exit the building to do so.

The staff is looking forward to our arrival. We may be assembling personal dignity kits and flood buckets, inventorying donations, shellacking or assembling desks, repairing bicycles or sewing machines, or mending sheets and blankets. The staff will tell us what jobs need to be done, and we volunteer for which ones we feel we can do. We go to serve. We come home amazed at their organization and humbled by the difference we make in the short time we are there. They have amazing stories to share about how God works with them to touch the lives of people all over the world. Check out their website at www.midwestmission.org.

The Adult Mission trip departs from the church parking lot at 9:00 am on Wednesday, Mar. 30. We carpool down to the Springfield area, and do some sightseeing on the way. We will watch the covid numbers and make a detailed itinerary in March.

You have a choice of staying in the dormitory at Midwest Mission Distribution Center or at the Comfort Inn and Suites. At the dorm, there are two bunk beds in each room, but you will be assigned the room for just yourself unless you want to pair up with anyone (and receive a discount). You need to supply your own towel and bedding. The dorm has a full kitchen, men's and women's showers, air-conditioning, and wifi.

If you choose to stay at the Comfort Inn, you will make your own arrangements. They will have a block of rooms set aside for us (under the name of River of Life) for Wednesday and Thursday nights at a discounted rate (\$95 per night). The Comfort Inn's phone number is 217-529-8898. They will need your reservation by Mar. 16.




Love, Justice and Service: Answering the Call

Today we are featuring a special edition:


The One Year Bible

This is an unusual version/translation of the Bible. First it is written in today's English, so no one can complain about strange 17th century words. Secondly it's divided into 365 small bites; each daily reading consists of a portion of the Old Testament, the New Testament, the Psalms and Proverbs. Thus no one can complain about having to read long, boring sections. In the third place, you don't have to start on January 1; just start any day and keep reading each day, when you get back to the day you started, you will have read the entire Bible. It takes about 10-15 minutes a day to accomplish this. Give it a try and you will be surprised by the satisfaction you get from doing this to say nothing of the blessings you will receive while reading God's Word.

Loose Coins for January

January loose coins will go to **Northcott Neighborhood House**, a multi-program community center in Milwaukee, started in 1961 by the United Methodist Women, the Wisconsin Conference and the General Board of Global Ministries. Northcott's beginnings were a lot like the startup of Caritas in Beloit, providing food, clothing, and a support system for families out of an older house in the city.

Today Northcott Neighborhood House takes up several modern buildings and serves 10,000 community residents a year. They provide job skills, employment opportunities, and basic food and clothing necessities, as well as recreational facilities and community meeting space. They also offer educational opportunities for all ages, including GED, literacy, Head Start, and after-school programs at locations around the city.


Northcott Neighborhood House has really grown since that first food and clothing bank started by UMW. It's still supported by UMW and the Wisconsin Conference, among many other community funding partners. It serves one of the most segregated cities in the nation with community building and family support.

Mar. 30 - Apr. 1, 2022

Join our team volunteering at the Midwest Mission Distribution Center! You can choose to stay on-site at the dormitory or stay 7 miles away at the Comfort Inn and Suites in Springfield, IL. We leave Beloit the morning of Wed., Mar. 30, and carpool to Springfield, IL. We will work on Thurs. and Fri., and return to Beloit on Friday evening, Apr. 1.

If you stay in the dormitory, the cost of the trip is \$175 plus the cost of one lunch and 3 dinners at area restaurants. If you choose to stay at the motel, the cost of the trip is \$90 plus the cost your room at the Comfort Inn and the cost of the previous meals. The Comfort Inn will have a block of rooms under the name of "River of Life" for approximately \$95 per room per night. You are welcome to arrange to share a room with another person on the trip.

A familiar refrain in The United Methodist Church is that our apportionment costs are too high and prohibitive. Couldn't we do more if we kept the money ourselves and spent it closer to home? The simple and quick answer to that is NO. Let's say a person puts one dollar in the collection plate on a Sunday morning. What actually happens to that dollar; how much goes to pay apportionments, and how much gets used locally? First, eighty-four cents (\$.84) of every dollar stays right in the church where it is given. For the average United Methodist church, half of that amount pays salaries and benefits, a quarter pays insurance, building, and maintenance costs, 15% covers programs, equipment, and ministry expenses, 7% goes to administrative and material costs, and 3% goes to missions. If apportionments stayed in the local church, there is little evidence that it would be spent on missions. Of the remaining sixteen cents (\$.16), approximately 80% stays in the annual conference paying for conference programs and staff, district superintendents, and specialized missions and ministries. Two cents (\$.02) goes to general church apportionments, and a penny (\$.01) goes to Advance Specials, Special Sunday offerings, and other miscellaneous funds.

Apportionments remind us that our faith and devotion to God is bigger than our immediate area. Apportionments remind us that all of us share the same planet and are tasked with taking care of our living environment (Genesis 2:15). Apportionments remind us that all Methodists are connected to God and to each other whether they are down the road a piece or on the other side of the globe.
