Praying beauty into the lives of each of us,



I Wonder.....

It has been a couple of months since I have been able to say hi and update my church family about how things are going for Gary and I since our cancer journey began. I've been wondering a lot of things lately and I thought I would share them with you.

I wonder if.... I have remembered to share my newest updates. On January 14th I was scheduled to have the next step in my treatment, a difficult surgery called the Whipple. Dr.'s remove certain digestive parts including part of the pancreas with the tumor and then reconnect the digestive system a bit differently. It is a difficult procedure with a difficult recovery. Even though they began the procedure laparoscopically without finding any trouble, during the main surgery they found a couple of spots where the cancer has spread. Once they discover something else, the Whipple cannot be completed. Not the best news, but in my mind I tried to put a better thought to it figuring I might not have done well with the rest of the surgery or the recovery and this was the best outcome for me. I am recovering very well and will meet with the Oncologist for the next plan of treatment which will probably include more chemo. Thank you for your encouraging words and prayers before, during and after the surgery.

I wonder ifmy church family knows how much I miss being in church. My faith and my church families from the very beginning (no matter where I have lived) have always been such an important part of my life story. I miss seeing everyone and sharing your smiles. Wait...I was able to attend in person on February 6th and loved every second. My favorite hymns, the beautiful choir, and so many smiles and well wishes and some "fresh air friendship" afterwards. A perfect Sunday!

I wonder ifmy mailman knows about all the love inside the cards he has been delivering to my mailbox since June. Typically the Bolar's have a pretty boring mailbox experience ...a few magazines, more than a few bills, and enough publisher clearing house entries to cover the Beloit Memorial High School Football field...nothing really for a rural mail delivery guy to get excited over. I wonder if he can feel the special unique creativeness in each one. I wonder if he notices the colors of the envelopes, the special stamps and stickers, and the postmarks from all over the United States. I wonder if he knows how we (both Gary and I) enjoy opening and reading each one. I wonder if he can imagine the strength and encouragement each one provides.

I wonder if... the team of doctors and nurses at the UW can feel the support we have from family and friends and the faith I carry into each appointment and treatment day. If it wasn't for the drawings and cards from my kids and grandchildren, my flat Jesus, and your encouragement and support, the days would be much harder. I hope my confidence in my faith and the love and support of my Lord and Savior shines through me for others to see even at my worst moments.

I wonder if....we will ever find the words to say thank you to everyone for the amazing meals, the prayers, the gifts and cards, the phone calls, and the friendships during this difficult time. We have been able to get to know everyone a little better even if we have been apart and we are so grateful! Thank you for being GOD's message, light and love to each day and to those that you encounter. God Bless you all.

LOOSE COINS FAMILY PROMISE OF GREATER BELOIT

Our Loose Coins for the month of February will go to Family Promise of Greater Beloit. This emergency shelter program for homeless families is affiliated with the national Family Promise organization, which provides a successful model for helping families in crisis -- by providing temporary housing when needed, case management, housing and job-seeking support, and the food and hospitality provided by partner churches.

Partnering with church congregations makes it possible for Family Promise to host 3-4 families at a time, 365 days a year. Congregations provide space in their buildings for one week at a time, offering food, hospitality, and temporary night shelter for families going through a difficult time. During the day families go the Family Promise day center to shower and receive support services.

The mission is to get families out of temporary shelter into a better future. Sometimes rent or transportation assistance, or mediation with a landlord, or assistance securing a job or housing placement is all that stands between homelessness and security.

We all know the need is great in the stateline area, and Family Promise is a vital organization that knows how to make a difference. Our local Family Promise is on the cusp of growing its program. Watch for news, and please give generously -- of your loose coins, or bills/checks marked for Loose Coins.





Defy Domestic Abuse champions the inherent dignity of all people, and restores safety and dignity to all those affected by domestic abuse and violence while interrupting and dismantling the personal, communal and cultural catalysts of domestic abuse and violence.

Social Justice/Social Action: What is it?

The United Methodist Women are committed to Social Justice, which is described by the organization as Social Action. https://www.unitedmethodistwomen.org/action.

This is not the same as a government that distributes the wealth of a nation. This is not about the possession of wealth,

but rather, equality in everyday existence The UMW work through Service and Advocacy.

The current Social Action Campaigns of the UMW are Climate Justice, Criminalization of Communities of Color and Mass Incarceration. Past Social Action Campaigns have been Economic Inequality, Maternal and Child Health, Human Trafficking, Global Migration, Domestic Violence, Climate Change, Gender Justice, Racial Justice, Economic Justice, Health Care, Food Justice.

Each month we will take a look at the history of Social Action by UMW, the Biblical basis for Social Action and current efforts of UMW for Service and Advocacy.



Faithful Stewardship in a Time of Uncertainty



For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: Ecclesiastes 3:1-8

a time to be born, and a time to die;
a time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted;
a time to kill, and a time to heal;
a time to break down, and a time to build up;
a time to weep, and a time to laugh;
a time to mourn, and a time to dance;
a time to throw away stones, and a time to gather stones together;
a time to embrace, and a time to refrain from embracing;
a time to seek, and a time to lose;
a time to keep, and a time to throw away;
a time to tear, and a time to sew;
a time to keep silence, and a time to speak;
a time to love, and a time to hate;
a time for war, and a time for peace.

This has been a time of dramatic disruption and ongoing uncertainty, as the novel coronavirus COVID-19 continues to take thousands of lives, requiring social distancing that upends the global economy, and prevents us from coming together in response to crisis, as we ordinarily would. The challenges to our faith and religious practice are very real. All of our ways of being faith communities together have been paused, discontinued, or rearranged. Meetings, pastoral care, and worship are all being conducted remotely, online or asynchronously, as we isolate in our homes. Every day we read or hear about people who are sick, dying, or vulnerable, as well as about the sacrifices made by healthcare workers and those in other essential professions who enable this large-scale response. In this circumstance, we are beginning to ask about an unknown future, returning to "normal" seems nostalgic, and even identifying a "new normal" may be beyond the scope of our current position. Yet, we cannot help but look ahead to a time when we resume activities of daily life. How can we be faithful stewards in this season of uncertainty?

Faithful stewardship may require patience, endurance, and sacrifice, and it may not always match our ideals or ambitions. Yet there can be new life that comes from what appears to be fallow time or a makeshift solution. Faithful stewardship can also be dynamic and responsive to external challenges, recognizing the opportunity in difficulty, and opening us to the gifts of the season. In this sense, stewardship is not primarily a strategy, or a marketing plan, even if it calls us to new practices. Online worship, emailed bulletins, Zoom meetings and electronic giving apps instead of offering plates might feel tactical, but they can be holy expressions of our faithfulness in a time of change. We may find that faithful stewardship in this season bears unexpected fruit far beyond our current crisis. Faithful stewardship in a time of uncertainty can allow us the time and freedom to discern the purpose God has for every aspect of our lives, and to encourage our communities and institutions to do the same.

Let us continue with our Faithful Stewardship not just in our monetary giving, but reaching out to each other.
