What is Lent?

Lent is the 40 days (not including Sundays) from Ash Wednesday to the Saturday before Easter. Lent is often described as a time of preparation and an opportunity to go deeper with God. It is a time of reflection and asking for forgiveness, and when Christians prepare to celebrate Jesus's resurrection at the feast at the end of Easter, which comes at the very end of Lent.

As a Lenten Discipline this year, I will be repeating what I did last year. I will be praying over each family and individual of our congregation personally, and then I will write each family or individual a card. If you do not receive a card from me sometime between now and Easter, please let the office know, as you may be in our database incorrectly.

You are a beautiful, beloved child of God! You were created in the Image of God. You don't look like God, but you were created with God's characteristics. You were created to be love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness and gentleness.

You are also a sinner. You can never be good enough to earn God's love.

Both of those statements are true. Which one do you have a harder time believing? For some people, believing that they are a beautiful, beloved

child of God is almost impossible. For others, because they try so hard to be good, they don't want to hear that they are sinners.

There is a confirmation lesson that I particularly like. I tell the students that we are going to see if they are a good enough person to get into heaven. The students begin adding up points for doing good things like helping a parent when you aren't asked, and doing something nice for a friends or teacher. I don't remember all of the things students get points for, but by the time we tally up all of their good works points, they are feeling pretty good about themselves. Then we add up points for doing bad things, like not doing what your parents ask you to do, or sassing or lying to them, or fighting with your siblings. It doesn't take long before all of the students have negative points. Then I ask the question: are you good enough to get into heaven by what you do? The answer is no.

We were created beautiful, beloved children of God, but we are not very old before the mess of sin begins making that beauty hard to see.

During Lent, we are talking about this very thing. We are created in the image of God, but we sin. We are in need of a Savior. Good thing for Jesus!

As we progress through this series, we will see how Jesus saves us for an eternity with God. We will also see how God's grace helps us clean up our messes so that, through the way we live, people can see that image of God within us. As we grow to become more like Jesus, doing good things will flow from that love of God within us. When we do good things, people will see Jesus!

I hope you will join us in person or online as we continue to explore how the grace of God restores that beautiful image of God within us.

Loose Coins

March Loose Coins will go to **Beloit Meals on Wheels**. This volunteer-supported program delivers hot meals 5- or 7-days/week, including holidays, to Beloit-area seniors whose diminished mobility makes it hard to shop for food, prepare meals, or even socialize with others. Hot, nutritious meals, prepared by Best Events, are delivered during the midday, with the option of receiving a cold supper in addition.

Meals on Wheels is a life-line to countless individuals, in terms of both nutrition and human interaction. Funding for the program comes from community donations, federal funds, and client contributions. A single meal costs the organization \$10, but no one is denied service due to inability to pay.

The volunteers who drive and deliver consider it a ministry to others, and those of us who can contribute to support it are helping make that ministry possible. Please be generous with your loose coins!

Note: "Loose coins" are considered any coins (not bills) dropped in the offering plate. To contribute bills, put them in an envelope marked "Loose Coins," or write a check with "Loose Coins" in the memo line. Include your name and offering-envelope number to record it in your church giving record.



Blessed to be a Blessing



As I was reading our newsletter that is written by Jason Mahnke, Director of Programming & Campaigns, Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation, I'd like to share with you what he wrote on how to help parents teach financial practices to your children; he writes;

In his book *Creating Generous Congregations*, David Heetland tells a story about an 8-year-old girl who often gave more than a tithe from her nickel and dime allowance. She once gave her grandmother 38cents in small coins "for missions." Her grandmother then asked her, "Do you want this to go for homeless people, hospitals in Africa, or buying fish to stock ponds to feed the hungry?"

Her granddaughter replied, "Just a minute," and returned shortly with 29 cents more, making a total of 67 cents to be divided three ways. She found each mission so important that her initial gift was instantly almost doubled so she could support all three. Too often, we worry that when we ask someone to support a ministry with either their time or their money, the request will be taken as pushy (at best) or offensive (at worst). And there are certainly people who would take it that way.

On the other hand, I believe that not inviting people to support a ministry I'm excited about excludes them from being a part of something that may be transformational for them, and the people touched by the ministry.

Finally, there are many people who are just waiting to be asked to be a part of something bigger than them. They may not be the first to raise their hands when a general invitation goes out but would love to be personally invited to be a part of what God is doing through the church.

Too often, we shield our children from our financial practices because they're "personal" or "private." Of course, that means our children will have no model for understanding how to handle their finances except for what our culture teaches. I would argue that this is a dangerous practice that often leads our children down the path of discontentment and debt.

What if our stewardship and finance teams spent time teaching parents how to talk to their children about money from the perspective of our faith? How does our earning, spending, saving, and giving reflect our values?

Here are two books that can aid you in that conversation: *Smart Money, Smart Kids, by* Rachel Cruze and Dave Ramsey. *It's Not Fair! A Book About Having Enough* by Caryn Rivandeneira.
