Please join our team volunteering at the Midwest Mission Distribution Center! You can choose to stay on-site at the dormitory or stay 5 miles away at the Baymont Inn in Springfield, IL. We will leave Beloit the morning of Wed., Sept. 4, and carpool to Springfield, IL. We will work on Thurs. and Fri., and return to Beloit on Friday evening, Sept. 6.

If you stay in the dormitory, the cost of the trip is \$140 plus the cost of one lunch and 3 dinners at area restaurants. If you choose to stay at the motel, the cost of the trip is \$95 plus the cost your room at the Baymont Inn. The Baymont has a block of rooms under the name of "Midwest Mission Distribution Center" for approximately \$60 per room per night. You are welcome to arrange to share a room with another person on the trip.

Please do NOT let the cost of the trip keep you from signing up! There is money available in a fund specifically to help people with the cost of participating in the adult mission trip. Please let Diane Gemignani know if you are interested in the assistance.

LET'S GO GREEN!!

At the last RoL Administrative Council Meeting we agreed to start looking at our church going GREEN. We are suggesting to everyone as they serve our church, in whatever capacity to consider this.

In the UNITED METHODIST BOOK OF DISCIPLINE it says: All creation is the Lord's and we are responsible for the ways in which we use and abuse it. Water, air soil, minerals, energy resources, plants animal life, and space are to be valued and conserved because they are God's creation and not solely because they are useful to human beings. God has granted us stewardship of creation. We should meet these stewardship duties through acts of loving care and respect. (Social Principles, paragraph 160.)

The UMW board has discussed this need and has embarked on the beginning of what we can do. Instead of using disposable products such as Styrofoam, paper plates, plastic utensils, plastic table cloths we have begun by purchasing glass tableware that we will be able to wash in our new commercial dishwasher, tablecloths that are re-useable and durable and coated, to be simply wiped off. We have plates, cups, luncheon plates and small sauce dishes. We will start using them at our Unit Meetings and hope the Hospitality Committee will begin using them at our after church fellowship gathering. It will be awhile before we can do so since we need to finish the cabinetry and clean the kitchen. The tableware is in storage and once we get the kitchen cleaned we will wash all the dishes and put them in the kitchen cabinets. We also hope that the WATR dinner will also consider using the tableware. Think of what we can save from going to landfills if we all work together on this. Thank you for helping us GO GREEN. Become a "BE JUST BE GREEN ADVOCATE".





Settling In

From the Deco & Furnishings Committee

Just like any move or household renovation, things happen in phases. We have made it to the "settling in" phase! Please keep in mind there will definitely be a period of adjustment. The Decorating & Furnishings Committee's work is not done. We are waiting to see how things work, and what specific needs may require some adjustment and fine tuning.

Sanctuary chairs - This is the biggest adjustment for most. Please keep in mind, the driving force behind the chairs is their FLEXIBILITY! Chairs may be removed and adjusted to accommodate walkers wheelchairs, baby carriers, wider aisles, or other such needs, just let an usher know. Hymnals will be located below the seat in front of you for easiest access. The layout and spacing of the chairs can be adjusted for any occasion - weddings, funerals, special events, services, etc. There are 170 chairs total (including the choir loft).

The Altar/Choir Loft - This area was strategically built. The top two tiers of the choir loft can be carefully removed to create one, wide open "stage" area, if needed. This was built with the future in mind, as our church will grow and change in new, unknown directions.

Balcony - The balcony offers one of the most practical changes - a clear glass panel so that you can easily see from above. In the balcony you will find alternative seating - 2 loveseats, a couch, and end tables. Feel free to relax in the balcony and enjoy worship. The balcony area was also designed as a small group gathering space for anyone to use - bible studies, discussion groups, meetings, etc. Just slide one loveseat around to make a U-shaped seating area for your group!

Youth and Multi-purpose Room (across from choir room) - This new room was created to be flexible. It will be the home of some of our youth groups, and can also be used for meetings, small groups, etc. It houses a wipe-off board on wheels that can be used by anyone, anywhere throughout the building. On Monday evenings, it will be home to the new Scouts of America Troop for girls (ages 11-17) that ROL has agreed to support and charter. This space was created to house some fun!

The Storage Room - This is the room that is going to require communication, flexibility, and ownership by all! The east wall will be left open to accommodate the extra tables and chairs in the building. Storage racks have been installed; they will be labeled to designate a storage area for the various groups that require a bit of storage. This transition period is the ideal time to please have your group revisit what they typically store to determine if it is still needed, or if it is time to weed-out excess that has been collecting. It is a big space that needs to be tended to and kept organized, let's work together to make that happen! (NO aluminum cans in this room PLEASE!)

Still to come....

The Education Rooms - These will also be freshened up and reconfigured a bit by adding an area for infants and toddlers while defining the rooms for younger and upper elementary students. The current high school room (with the couch) will transition to an education room, and the south east corner of Fellowship Hall (area behind the accordion doors) will have a comfortable seating area for our high schoolers to gather.

Landscaping - Our beautiful new building will soon be accented by complimentary new landscaping!

The Deco & Furnishings Committee would like to thank the congregation for all of their, patience, help, and willingness to work together to create a true church home for all!


