This newsletter is planned to be distributed on Palm Sunday. I love Palm Sunday! I love shouting "Hosanna!" and waving palm branches! The following Sunday is Easter. I love Easter! I love the Easter hymns and the promise of new life! But, in between those two Sundays, is a tough week. It is several days of heartbreak. Maundy Thursday begins nicely, but then ends in confusion and fear. Good Friday is gut-wrenching. Holy Saturday feels hopeless. Can't we just go from Palm Sunday to Easter?

Many Christians, do just that. For some it's a time issue. Some don't see the importance. Some don't want to sit through the pain. Still others don't like the theological idea of the blood of the substitutionary atonement.

Whether or not you were planning on attending worship on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, I think you should. We worship a God who came to Earth at Christmas as God With Us. United Women in Faith

Name News

In a press release dated March 2, 2022, the United Methodist Women became United Women in Faith on March 3. While the change came as a surprise to many, the press release stated that the change had been under consideration for five years and that more than 24,000 UMW and women of other Christian traditions were part of the research.

During the 150 year existence of this mission group, the name and programs have been changed at least five times to match changing times and needs. UMW are rebranding themselves with a new name, a new website and new programs. The current change was pushed by public perceptions, declining membership and schism threats. Although the name has changed, the goals of caring for women, children and youth remain unchanged.

Changes coming with the new name include:

- A new website which is supposed to be easier to navigate
- "All-access" national membership which does not require membership in a local UMC
- Soul Care Retreats focusing on nurturing women's bodies, minds and spirits
- Innovations to Mission u with new curricula each year for each age group but focused on a shared biblical theme
- More targeted giving options and new interactive online resources.

United Women in Faith believe that love in action can change the world.

Assuming that these reasons have not changed, the information from the old website will be reprinted here.

Our Biblical Foundations

The Bible teaches us that all creation is God's and "very good" in and of itself (Genesis 1:31). It teaches that God created humankind in God's image—all humankind (Genesis 1:27).

We don't yet live in a society that treats God's creation with dignity and respect. We still live in a world where institutional structures and social relations oppress people and defy the will of God. Yet the Bible tells the story of God always and everywhere at work for liberation and healing, justice and peace. When asked what was the greatest commandment, Jesus answered:

"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind.' This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself." (Matthew 22:37-39)

To love our neighbor—and ourselves—means more than just providing care and comfort in times of suffering; to love our neighbor as ourselves we must change the systems that do harm in the first place.

This was a vital message of Jesus' ministry, challenging the existing social order, proclaiming God's reign:

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because God has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. God has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor." (Luke 4:18-19)

The early Christian community recognized the vitality of this call. Christianity is not just something we believe, it is also something we practice. We are called to be "doers of the word, and not merely hearers" (James 1:22). We are called to a living faith—a faith that makes itself known by its fruits.

Indeed, God is always at work to make change in the world, appearing in unexpected ways and reversing the norms of "polite" society to ensure abundant life and wholeness for all. United Methodist Women Social Action Campaign. All Rights Reserved





Gosh, where does one start! The excitement of being part of a



phonemical church that has so much to offer this Holy Week. Both of our campuses have a lot to offer to our members and to our communities. This is a time to step out of your comfort zones and be a part of your faith. "For too long, we've called unbelievers to 'invite Jesus into your life.' Jesus doesn't want to be in your life. Your life's a wreck. Jesus calls you into his life. And his life isn't boring or purposeless or static. It's wild and exhilarating and unpredictable." — Adam Hamilton, John: The Gospel of Light and Life . I can associate this quote with Adam Hamilton to the recent Sermon Series / Bible Study that we are currently finishing up from Tom Berliln's book: Restored: Finding Redemption in our Mess.

We've started our Lenten time with Ash Wednesday, and now we have journeyed to the beginning of Holy week. The Maundy Thursday service will be held at ROL Beloit campus at 6:30pm. Good Friday services will be held at ROL Beloit campus at Noon; Clinton Campus: at Emmanuel Community Church, 381 East Street, Clinton at noon; Tenebrae Service at Jefferson Prairie Lutheran Church, Poplar Grove IL, 5 miles south of Clinton at 7pm; Saturday Night Service at 5:30pm Beloit Campus and we've added a new service this year: A Holy Saturday service, Easter Vigil. This will held at Clinton Campus, April 16 at 6pm.



👉 🦇 🚳 During the Great Three Days, from sunset Holy Thursday to sunset Easter Day, we celebrate the saving events of Jesus Christ's suffering, death, and resurrection. In the development of Christian worship, each event came to be remembered on a separate day. In the earliest centuries, however, these events were celebrated as a unity in an extraordinary single liturgy that began Saturday night and continued until the dawn of Easter Day. It was known as the great Paschal

(Easter) Vigil. Preceded by a fast day, it was the most holy and joyful night of the entire Christian year, for it proclaimed and celebrated the whole of salvation history and Christ's saving work. The Easter Vigil is the First Service of Easter. The following service is an adaptation of the ancient Paschal Vigil service and consists of four parts: (1) The Service of Light, (2) The Service of the Word, (3) The Service of the Baptismal Covenant, and (4) The Service of the Table. Thus we celebrate God's saving work in Christ through the symbols of light, word, water, and the heavenly banquet. This service leads us up to Easter Sunrise service being held at Clinton Campus, beginning at 6:30am with Breakfast to follow.



In this dramatic Easter monologue, The Little Drummer Boy has grown up and comes to a crisis of faith as he witnesses firsthand the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. How his parents had passed when he was very young, no close relatives to live with, how he found himself going out to the fields and living with the Shepherds, witnessing the time of the census, seeing Baby Jesus for the first time at the manager where he lay, looking into those baby eyes, bonding with

Jesus, then plays his drum for him as his gift to him; then he was asked several years later to play his drum on that dreadful day; A day that he could not understand why he was there, a day he again came face to

face with Jesus, a day he looked into this man's eyes, a day of A Drummer boy Pum PumPum Pum.....

Loose Coins

April Loose Coin offerings will go to **Caritas**, a community resource center for families in need in the state line area. Caritas is, first of all, a food pantry, focusing on nutritious, healthy food – fruits and vegetables, whole grains, dairy, protein, and basic staples. Families can receive three days' worth of meals – breakfast, lunch, and dinner – twice a month.

In addition, the center offers a diaper bank, including infant and toddler clothing and baby accessories, which can be used by families once a month. There is a community garden program, where people receive seeds, plants, tools, training, and a plot in the community garden, so that families can learn how to provide their own food.

Caritas was founded 45 years ago by four ministers and their churches, including our own Rev. Jerry Krause and the downtown First Church. In the beginning it was housed in our church and run by volunteers from the four churches. Within three months there was enough support to hire a coordinator, and before long they acquired a building. Today Caritas is in its third building, with a very committed paid director, part-time staff, and 100+ volunteers. This truly grassroots agency still receives all of its funding from donations – churches, businesses, community groups, and grants.

Caritas serves more than 18,000 people a year in the state line area. It goes without saying that the need is great. To contribute to the Loose Coins offering, you can put coins in the collection plate, or write a check to the church with "Loose Coins" on the memo line, or put cash in an envelope marked for Loose Coins. Please be generous!

Stewardship of Lent and Holy Week



"Lent, he said, is the season that the church has set aside for us to intentionally reflect on our relationship with God, others, and ourselves. It is a time to reflect on those things that bring us closer to God and others, and those things that keep us alienated from God and others." Pastor Gregg.

I remember in my younger years growing up in a small town. When Lent and Easter rolled around, our small church, like the other churches in town, things started to become lively like it was Christmas time in spring. You'd hear folks talking about how the Sanctuary was going to be decorated on certain days of the week and how they were working on special events for the adults and children of the church. Even the Sunday School teachers had plans for us each week. I remember one week going to Sunday School and the teachers handed each of us a small church card board box with a slit on top. The teacher explained to us that during the time of Lent, is the season that the church has set aside for us to intentionally reflect on our relationship with God, others, and ourselves. It is a time to reflect on those things that bring us closer to God and others, and those things that keep us alienated from God and others. Our teacher also explained to us that the time of Lent is a time where we give something up. WOW! I couldn't do that. I didn't want to. I was so upset that I told my Mom that I didn't want to Sunday School anymore. She thought about it and talked with Pastor Gregg about me being so upset like the other kids in my Sunday School class. Pastor Gregg came into our class the next Sunday. He explained why we should try to give something up. He said that we aren't necessarily giving something up, that we needed to add something new during the Lent time. Maybe with adding something new during Lent, we'd learn to give something else away. It was like the church box with the slit on the top. We were putting loose coins in the box to help those in need through our giving at church.

When I started my journey on being on the Stewardship committee years past, I thought about how could we help those in need during Lent. Back in my Sunday School years, our teachers passed out a coin folder. This folder was to collect quarters and once the folder was full, we turned them to church. It was exciting to see how soon we could fill up that folder and how many we could get turned in within six weeks of Lent. Another time I gave away old grievances, and rebuilt some relationships. Having the Sunday School teachers and Pastor Gregg teach us about Lent was a great thing for many of us. Especially for me. Learning to give and to help others to help walk with Jesus during their difficult time in their lives.

We are here as God's stewards. You and I are called to learn generosity by giving. We are called to model it for children.

Welcome, David Newman

The Staff Pastor Parish Relations Committee, River of Life UMC, and the Chancel Choir in particular, are excited to welcome David Newman as our new church pianist. We have heard over the past few weeks the high caliber of David's playing, but the story of his impressive background will attest even more to how lucky we are to have him.



Listed in *Who's Who Among American Keyboard Artists*, David began playing the piano at the age of 3 in Rochester, New York. He earned a Bachelor of Music in piano performance at the State University of New York at Fredonia, where he also won the annual Concerto Competition. He continued his studies at the University of Michigan and then accepted a scholarship to the Guildhall School of Music and Drama in London. There he earned the highest performing honor, the Concert Recital Diploma. Returning to the U.S., he followed his Michigan teacher to Rutgers University, graduating with a Master of Music degree in piano performance. As a teaching assistant at Rutgers, David taught piano to under-graduates and was pianist for the Princeton Ballet Theater. He also served as organist and pianist for the school's student ministries, as well as teaching piano and music appreciation classes at neighboring community colleges.

Moving to Chicago, David began a career as a much-in-demand musician at venues all around the city, including the Steppenwolf Theater Company, University of Chicago, Northwestern University, DePaul, the Chicago Cultural Center, and many others. He served as staff accompanist in the studios of several Chicago Symphony members and served on the faculties of St. Xavier University and the Merit Music Program (a subsidized music education program for inner-city children). For many years he served as Music Director at St. John's United Church of Christ in Evanston.

Since moving to Beloit (where he has family) in 2008, David has performed widely in solo and chamber recitals, has performed a number of concertos with area orchestras, including the Lake Geneva Symphony Orchestra and the Beloit Janesville Symphony Orchestra, and is the pianist for the Choral Union in Janesville. He founded the chamber ensemble Zephyr, which many of us heard in concert recently in the Musica Maxima series at First Congregational Church.

And we have him! We feel incredibly blessed to have David's high level of talent, and look forward to continuing and growing our music ministry following the retirement of Judy Paddock. River of Life is a singing church, and our congregation appreciates good music. Not only does David bring that, but he brings kindness, humility, and a willingness to adapt to anything we need him to do. David has indicated that he hopes to serve here for many years, and we couldn't be more thrilled!
