





What is life like for people living close to the US/Mexican Border?



April Loose Coins

Loose Coin offerings for April will go to **Caritas**, our locally supported food pantry and diaper bank for families in need in the state line area. Our church has a long history with Caritas of volunteerism and donations, going back to its founding in the 1970s. Pat and Roger Sands are our church's liaisons to Caritas, and Pat provided this update:

Caritas is bustling. While the number of visitors so far this year has been less than in 2022, the households are larger, so they are actually serving more people. Caritas expects to serve more people and households than ever throughout 2023 due to several COVID-19 emergency allotments ending.

The financial footing of Caritas is good at the present time. The new roof is paid for, the warehouse is full, and the bank account is in good shape. Max Dodson, the Director, continues to look forward to opportunities for future funding to cover the anticipated increase in need this year. He is constantly writing for grants from various companies. Recently Max completed the third step in the Campbell Soup grant application, which was a personal interview. Campbells will award a \$20,000 grant soon, and we are in the running.

The diaper bank handed out 2,522 diapers in January and 2,280 in February.

Soon the community garden program will start up for the year. It provides families with seeds, plants, tools, and training, along with a plot in the community garden so that families can learn how to provide their own food.


The challenges will be great in 2023; however, with good management and generous donors, Caritas will continue seeing to the needs of the community. Your generous support is appreciated!

Stewardship and the Holy Spirit



Often, when the word "stewardship" is uttered in the church, we think of money, giving, and budgets.

With the celebration of Earth Day, April is one of many occasions when we can remind ourselves that Christian stewardship is broader than just money. Here are just a few teachings on creation that have been passed on through the ages.

How would you define stewardship? Stewardship is another way of talking about ministry, and it would revolutionize ministry if people could think of it in terms of stewardship. We are accountable to God for what we do and with what he has trusted to us.

The word stewardship comes from the Greek word, oikenomous, which means somebody who manages a household. A person doesn't own the household but manages it. And stewards in the ancient world, of course, were trusted with everything from seeing that the floors were clean, to the finances, to the public face of that household. Joseph is a good biblical example of that.

We are not the owners, but have been trusted with resources and the care of everything—Creation, gifts and talents, money, time, the gospel—for the sake of God's purposes in the world.

Stewardship is another way of talking about ministry. The word ministry in both Greek and Hebrew is the same word as servant. And servants are people who are at the disposal of another. And so once we replace the word ministry with the word service, we begin to see that stewardship is ministry in the sense that all of us, not just pastors, are responsible to do what God wants and are accountable to him. Of course, we hope to do that in the power of the Spirit, with the anointing touch of God. But it's a service to God and to the world simultaneously. So, the word ministry points to the source and the ultimate goal, and the word stewardship implies the care of people, resources, gifts and talents, and the grace of God.

Is our accountability to God just individual? We do have an individual responsibility. In the home, family, neighborhood, local church, workplace, etc. But we as individuals and the church could undertake the idea of stewardship much more holistically than we do. We think of stewardship as fundraising to pay off the building and to cover the pastor's salary and other expenses that keep the church going. But we should see that we're trustees of talents, gifts, time, treasure, and the culture and values in the society around us. We have great missionary examples that have been giving to those in need in our own backyards and beyond.

Even though we are good stewards of what God has given to us, and maybe we need to improve on being better stewards, are times when we need to open ourselves to the Holy Spirit so the Spirit can work through us. There are times when we come to face a situation when we need to pray about the outcome. I've spoken to several folks about the time we were looking to expand the camera operation for better online streaming. I went to Pastor Brenda and told her that I was exhausted working on the project for the week and that I had put it into God's hands. This was a Thursday and when I saw Pastor again when I returned from Clinton that preceding Sunday, she had great news from a person on where to find the system that we needed and how folks stepped up to help fund the project. God took the situation, heard my prayers and other folks as well and guided us to complete the project.

We need to continue praying the Breakthrough Prayer each and everyday. Let the Holy Spirit continue to work through each and everyone of us.


