

## **Loose Coins**

Loose Coins for May will go to the **Conference Ingathering**. Every year as our ministers and lay delegates gather for the Wisconsin Annual Conference in early June, they are asked to bring donations from their home churches for people in need. This year, again, the donations are going to Midwest Mission Distribution Center (MMDC), and they are collecting items for emergency response kits. They are also receiving monetary donations, which are used to purchase kit items and to send shipments to those in need in the U.S. and around the world.

Our church will be collecting items for the Personal Dignity Kits (see list below), in addition to the Loose Coins and other cash donations, through **Sunday**, **June 5**, and then they will be delivered to our pickup point at Janesville Asbury UMC.

The conference representatives for this project have told us that they are "hoping to receive complete kits," but individual kit items are also accepted. **All items must be new**. If you are able to purchase all the items for a kit, place them inside the 1-gallon resealable bag. Or you may prefer to buy just a few items, or multiples of one or more items.

**Note:** "Loose coins" are the coins (not bills) dropped in the offering plate. To contribute bills to this cause, put them in an envelope marked "Loose Coins," or write a check with "Loose Coins" in the memo line. Include your name and offering-envelope number to record it in your church giving record.

### Personal Dignity Kit (\$15 Value)

- 1 New Bath Hand Towel (Not kitchen)
- 1 New Bath Washcloth (Not dishcloth)
- 1 Adult Toothbrush (Single pack)
- 1 Bar Soap 3-4 oz.
- 1 Shampoo 15-18 oz.
- 1 Deodorant 2-3 oz. stick, roll-on, or pump
- 1-Gal. Resealable Plastic Bag

Looking ahead......June Loose Coins will go to Rock Valley Community Programs (RVCP), which provides transitional housing and addiction and mental health treatment to adults in the Rock County area. The 115- bed facility focuses on homeless veterans and individuals transitioning out of the criminal justice system. More information in the next Current.

Thank you to the people who have brought snacks to share, those who have contributed money for the purchase of snacks, and to everyone who has helped clean up in the kitchen afterward! The fellowship time helps our congregation and visitors connect as a family, and it's a great time to touch base with people.

As we get closer to summer, some of our consistent helpers will be traveling. We would like to see our fellowship time continue through the summer. Please consider signing up to bring snacks some Sunday. There is a clipboard on the serving table by the plates and napkins. It helps to sign up with someone else, but some people prefer to do the snacks by themselves. Either is fine.

Since covid numbers are down, we do not need to individually bag the snacks. You can lay out the snacks right before church starts, or you can leave the service during the last hymn to set up. Keep it simple. Two choices are fine. Cheese and crackers, veggies, fruit, and/or cookies are always popular, but you can get as creative as you like! We generally have about 50 people stay for snacks. But remember, if you run out of snacks, they can always buy some donuts on the counter.

We do ask that you wash up the serving dishes. We really appreciate it if you can rinse out the coffee urns as well. Plates and napkins are available in the hospitality cabinet in the kitchen. Plasticware is in the pantry. Thank you so much! If you have any questions, please ask Betty Hannum or Diane Gemignani.



### Stewardship of the Church

The devout investment or use of money, time and ability, in biblical times, a steward supervised a household or an estate. Today, as God's children, we deem God the source of all we have, seek to hold it in trust for God and desire to be "good stewards of the manifold grace of God." (I Peter 4:10a)

We use the word "stewardship" in the church as a way of talking about our responsibility for the faithful use of all the gifts that God has given us: our time and our abilities, our money and possessions, the environment, and our relationships.

We believe that everything we have is a gift from God, and God wants us to use it to make our world a more just and compassionate place for all God's people.

There are many ways to contribute financially to the church, here are some ways that you may, or may not considered.

### **Pledging & Tithing**



What is pledging? Is it is making a commitment to contribute financially each week (month/year) to the church. As your commitment to Christ and his church continues to grow, pledge to Grow One Step in your giving. This year, we are challenging ourselves to Grow Towards Tithing. To do this, you can consider raising your giving by 1 percent of your income (or growing a step in a dollar amount that makes sense in your situation.)

What is tithing? It is giving 10% of your income back to God. It is a gift returned to God as a way of giving thanks and expressing our faith that God will continue to provide for our needs. The Hebrew people gave God their "first-fruits" – the best and most choice of their crops and herds. We are invited to give a tithe (10%) of what we have received to our local church or church related programs. Some give the literal tithe, some give a certain percentage of their income, others have a plan for increasing their giving by a percentage until they reach the full tithe, and others give more than a tithe.




