



#StillInMission Events

#StillInMission Events are Zoom sessions that all UWF are invited to attend. The June meeting was a special "table talk" with women serving on the continent of Africa. Florence Mefor, Jane Kies, Lorraine Charinda, and Young Seon Kim shared stories about the joys and challenges of serving as women in mission. These missionaries serve in fields including agriculture, education, and healthcare, and range in length of service from more than 30 years to less than five. The panel addressed global stereotypes, cross cultural mission, and self-care. It was an interesting and informative event. Important points included:

The importance of learning the language. This is a long project, but local people are usually very happy and ready to help. They may chuckle at your mistakes, but it is all a learning experience. As a personal note, I've learned enough Spanish to connect with Mexicans in our area and along the border. Just as the panel said, they are always ready to help. I also found that the Mexicans want to speak English to me for their own practice!

The importance of learning local culture. Local culture may involve how people greet one another, especially in church. This might be much longer than you are accustomed to. Clothing is an issue and it is very important to dress for the occasion. One panel member told of being very, very embarrassed when she attended a funeral in casual hiking clothes. She tried very hard to make the outfit presentable, but she couldn't succeed. As a personal note it seems that in America everything is extremely casual, thus, as Americans, we really need to be aware of other cultural norms.

The importance of time. Some cultures take a great deal of time for most any activity. In Africa a church service is probably two hours long and that is just the way it is. Mealtime is another area which may require more time than we are used to.

The importance of local recreational activities. Local people enjoy singing and dancing. Long wedding are the norm. Vacations are unheard of, because life is about providing food and shelter. Almost everyone is always looking for a way to make money

These Christian missionaries told of how they spread hope and breaking old traditions by setting an example, being present, providing encouragement and a willingness to talk to all women. They also shared stories of women whose church outreach made a difference in their lives.

In answer to the question, "What impact do you want to see in your ministry in the future," the panel members said: The next general should be the leaders and will need the education to become the leaders, That, as leaders, they needed to do "do their homework" at all times even if it meant writing notes on toilet tissue! They wanted to give kids different values.

#StillInMission is an excellent way to get to know UM missionaries, where they serve and how to pray, share and connect with them.



Run, Hide, Fight

It has been a little over a year since the Armed Intruder Policy and Training was done for our church. Sadly, there is a need for us to keep these measures learned last year on our minds as we hear of shootings on a daily basis. Unfortunately, some of these have been in churches and by people who were not strangers to the church. We have been working on several plans to help us respond in such an emergency. Recently we have installed "Stop the Bleed" kits in our campus buildings. If you have not noticed these please check out the four locations in the Beloit church. These locations are in the main sanctuary near the front on the south wall, beside the defibrillator in the Fellowship Hall, in the Youth Room, and in the Choir Room. There is also one in the office building and one in the Clinton church. These kits contain life-saving resources like tourniquets, pressure dressings, gauze bandages, gloves and more for use by anyone to control bleeding. Take a look so that if the need ever arises you will know where they are.

Other measures are in the works in order to make our building as safe as we can. As many of you know the Beloit Campus building doors are locked after 9:30 on Sundays and the ushers or greeters will have to open the doors for late comers. Ushers are now sitting outside the main sanctuary entrance during the service to monitor the north and south doors. If you are having a meeting at other times it would be prudent to also lock doors before starting your meeting when all members have arrived.

In order to allow a safer escape route out of the sanctuary if needed, the north exit will be getting a concrete platform and sidewalk outside of the door that will be handicapped accessible and shoveled in winter. Always look around you when in the building and visualize where you would run or hide should the need arise. Be aware of items in any room that could be used as a weapon if you need to fight. Think about what you could use to barricade a door if you need to hide in a room. Blinds on windows and securing devices for doors that currently do not lock are also being looked at.

Remember that the best way for us to get help quickly is to call 911 from a cell phone. We will also be working on a numbering system for all the rooms and doors so look for that in the future. This will help both police and fire to come to the closest entrance to any emergency. If you have any other suggestions for our Committee please feel free to let me know.

LOOSE COINS

FOR THE REST OF JULY..... Loose Coins are going to Caritas and the Clinton Food Pantry.

BEGINNING IN **AUGUST**..... Loose Coin offerings will go to **Defy Domestic Abuse Beloit**, a program serving greater Beloit that operates under the umbrella of Family Services.

Domestic abuse doesn't just happen to women, and it doesn't only occur in marriages. It happens to all genders, all ages, all roles in domestic living situations. And domestic abuse is not just physical. It involves holding power over someone in order to control them. That power can be any combination of physical, verbal, sexual, financial, emotional, or social.

Defy Domestic Abuse Beloit provides a holistic approach to interrupting the cycle of abuse. Yes, they have a shelter and provide emergency housing, but beyond that first step of gaining safety, victims of abuse can access a wide range of services to empower and support them in dismantling the cycle of abuse:

- 24-hour crisis line that includes information on referral services
- Legal advocacy for assistance with restraining orders, and a representative to provide emotional support in court
- Program on parenting in families that have experienced abuse
- Support program for children affected by domestic violence
- Separate support groups for women, men who have suffered sexual assault and violence, and LGBTQ clients
- Financial counseling

All of these services are free to clients thanks to grants and the generosity of donors. Those who are interested in exploring other ways to help can go to their website (search Defy Domestic Abuse Beloit) and click on How You Can Help, to find links to needed donation items or volunteering options.

A Matter of Perspective



I came across an article from the Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation that I wanted to share with everyone. We are preaching the series of The Lord's Prayer and we are going to look closely at the words of this petition and get from it a deeper understanding and perspective on how God provides for us.

In Rev. Jason's article, He talks about how often words can be used to skew the truth.

Some things are simply a matter of perspective. We can be reminded often how words can be used to skew the truth. For instance, an interoffice softball game was held every year between the Marketing Department and support staff of one company. The day of the game, as hard as the marketers tried, the support staff whipped the marketing department soundly. In its best tradition, the Marketing Department decided to find the best "spin" they could on the dismal result. They showed how they earn their keep by posting this memo on the bulletin board after the game: "The Marketing Department is pleased to announce that for the recently completed softball season, we came in second place, having lost but one game all year. The Support Department, however, had a rather dismal season, as they won only one game all year." On the other hand, hidden beauty can also be found by looking at a situation in a different way. A little girl named Lauren (age 5) reports, "I know my older sister loves me because she gives me all her old clothes and has to go out and buy new ones." I think Lauren is on to something. Our entire lives can be shaped by perspective. How would I approach money, "stuff," and giving if I knew that God had already given me everything I need, rather than seeing all of the things I "need" in the store windows? How would I treat others if I focused on the ways I could serve, rather than making sure everyone respected my rights? How would my marriage change if it were based on being one another's servant rather than a struggle for power? What would my attitude be toward work be if I saw it as my God-given vocation rather than someplace I had to go to earn a paycheck? What if I saw Sunday as a true Sabbath; a time for connecting with God and family and rest, rather than a day to run the kids to more activities and the last day I have to get things done at home before I go to work? Sometimes we need God to help us see the world differently before we can live differently in it.

SUMMER CANTATA: MUSIC AND MESSAGE

Preaching and music have always worked together in our Methodist tradition. But this summer a convergence of message, music, people, and events is happening that will celebrate the triumphs in our church life over the past two years.

When Pastor Brenda Whitford came to us in July 2020, near the beginning of the pandemic, she had the difficult task of learning who we are behind the masks. And we had the challenge of becoming acquainted with our new pastor online. Pastor Brenda, we learned, was originally from Janesville, and in fact taught 5th and 6th grades at Merrill School in Beloit in the mid to late 1980's. She came to us after 20 years of serving the Shullsburg and Platteville United Methodist Churches.

Likewise during the pandemic, our Director of Music, Lois Ulvin, had the challenge of providing special music ensembles to help sustain meaningful worship during the long period of online and drive-in services. Lo and behold, when Pastor Brenda arrived, she was on the same page, providing recorded hymns that she sang with her daughter accompanying. We came to know, especially after in-person worship resumed, that Pastor Brenda is a huge supporter of choir music -- and that after 20 years serving churches with either a small or no choir, she is excited to sing in a choir averaging 20 people each week, and 30 for special events.

But when our long-time pianist/organist, Judy Paddock, retired during the pandemic shutdown, it was uncertain whether the church would find anyone of her caliber to support our music ministry going forward.

Then we were able to hire David Newman. He has a rich resume as a professional accompanist, church musician, and concert pianist. Our choir has again been able to perform the challenging music it is known for. We have come to know David's sensitive playing, his willingness to adapt to our needs, and his dry humor. Our very musical congregation has responded to his spirited playing as well as his kindness.

As we come into the summer season, there is much to celebrate in the life and ministry of our church. The tutoring program has concluded a successful year; Vacation Bible School is coming in August. Mission outreach is continuing. God has been at work in our midst. And God has one more surprise for us this summer.

In response to a well-received sermon series on the 23rd Psalm last summer, Pastor Brenda decided to do a series on The Lord's Prayer this summer. When Lois heard about the sermon series, she remembered a cantata by Pepper Choplin that she had picked up at a workshop. It was titled *Our Father: A Journey Through the Lord's Prayer*. What if we present that cantata, Lois said, as the culmination of the Lord's Prayer sermon series, here in our own sanctuary?

That is exactly what is going to happen! On Saturday, Aug. 6, at 3 p.m. and Sunday, Aug. 7, during 9:30 worship at the Beloit campus, the choir will present the cantata *Our Father: A Journey Through the Lord's Prayer*. It will be in our own church, with a scaled-down orchestra. (David's wife, Sue Newman, will be playing oboe in the orchestra, and has assisted with recruiting players.)

Like the sermon series, the cantata breaks The Lord's Prayer down into its several petitions (the things we are asking from God). It has pieces in different and very moving styles, informed by the parts of the prayer.

Come and hear the remaining sermons in this helpful series, and then come to the cantata Aug. 6-7. We will experience The Lord's Prayer anew. We will celebrate that our church has emerged from difficult times stronger than ever.
