After meetings with the Stewardship Committee, Finance Committee, Trustees, Ad Council, and conversations with the Clinton Campus congregation, the Ad Council has decided to form an exploratory committee to begin considering selling the Clinton Campus building. Paul Dubler will be chairing this committee. At this time, the Clinton Campus congregation will continue to worship at the Clinton Campus as usual.

Nearly everyone at the Beloit Campus understands the pain of moving from their building. May the people who attend the Beloit Campus hold the people who attend the Clinton Campus, in prayer and in person, as these explorations are being made.



Mission Committee

Our July Loose Coins offering will go to the **Clinton Community Outreach Program** (CCOP), formerly called the Clinton Food Pantry. The CCOP is a volunteer-run program designed to help those in need who reside within the Clinton School District boundaries. They have been serving the Clinton community for about 30 years. Each month they serve approximately 35-50 families.

The CCOP is supported by a network of area ministries and churches, and donations. In addition to providing food, the program makes the community aware of hunger related issues and works collaboratively with other agencies. They collect donations and raise funds to help alleviate hunger. They also provide food, clothing, health screenings and other assistance, or referrals, as needed.

The CCOP is housed in the First Presbyterian Church, which is a block away from our River of Life UMC Clinton church. The Food Pantry is open the second Saturday of every month from 8:30 - 10:00 a.m. for families to come in and pick up food. Coinciding with the Food Pantry each month, our Clinton campus offers a free pancake breakfast open to the public. Church members from Beloit and Clinton are encouraged to come out and share fellowship on each second Saturday, from approximately 8:30 -- 10:00.

Donations are accepted the second Saturday of every month from 8 -- 9 a.m. at First Presbyterian Church, 312 Church St., Clinton, or by calling to arrange a drop-off time. 
In this program, we will focus on healing and the power of touch. Touching is a way of connecting ourselves with the realities around us, both painful and joyful. Touch can be a form of knowledge and learning, and a form of healing. Healing is a form of stewardship, love, and relationship with one another.

In addition to community building, we can transform our world by imagining it differently, dreaming it passionately via all our senses, and willing it into creation. As we think inspiring, positive, lifegenerating thoughts and embody these thoughts in every act we perform, we can gradually change the mood of our days, the habits of years, and the beliefs of a lifetime.

In our work towards justice we must work to heal the wounds of the past and present and come close to touch each other's wounds and learn from them so that we can learn to heal ourselves and each other.

Changing the thoughts and ideas (the "stories") we live by and their limiting beliefs (including the national narrative of supreme entitlement) will enable us to extend our hand to others. When we give our hand to others we also have our heart and reason in hand. Individually and collectively, we can begin to share strategies on peaceful co-existence and spread forms of knowledge. Each of us can make a difference. By bringing psychological understanding and using spiritual approaches in political activism, we can stop the destruction of our moral, compassionate humanity. Empowered, we'll be motivated to organize, achieve justice, and begin to heal the world.

When we talk about healing, there are different mental images that come to mind. However, when we think of healing and caretaking, we often think of proximity and the warmth of touch. Touch such as the bleeding woman who approaches Jesus to find healing only by touching his mantle. (Mark 5:25-34)

Some things are simply a matter of perspective. We can be reminded often how words can be used to skew the truth. In its best tradition, the marketing department decided to find the best "spin" they could on the dismal result. They showed how they earn their keep by posting this memo on the bulletin board after the game: "The marketing department is pleased to announce that for the recently completed softball season, we came in second place, having lost but one game all year. The support department, however, had a rather dismal season, as they won only one game all year."

On the other hand, hidden beauty can also be found by looking at a situation in a different way. A little girl named Lauren (age 5) reports, "I know my older sister loves me because she gives me all her old clothes and has to go out and buy new ones."

I think Lauren is on to something. Our entire lives can be shaped by perspective. How would I approach money, "stuff," and giving, if I knew that God had already given me everything I need, rather than seeing all the things I "need" in the store windows? How would I treat others if I focused on the ways I could serve rather than making sure everyone respected my rights? How would my marriage change if it were based on being one another's servant rather than a struggle for power? What if I saw Sunday as a true Sabbath . . . a time for connecting with God and family and rest . . . rather than a day to run the kids to more activities and the day I must get things done at home before I go to work?
