



MISSION NEWS

So many things to talk about in Missions this month!

First of all, **Loose Coins** for November are going to **God's Fund**. This is a fund we keep at the church to meet occasional situations where people need a helping hand. Someone who needs support to go on a mission trip or to church camp....someone struggling to get by who needs a gas card to get to work. In the past we have also kept some of this money on account with the Salvation Army, where we would refer people who ask for help at the church. The Salvation Army is equipped to screen and serve people in need.

In December, Loose Coins will go to the **Salvation Army**. Though some services have moved to Janesville, the Beloit location is still open three half-days a week. The Salvation Army provides free daily noon meals, a food pantry, addiction counseling, and many other services to alleviate both the symptoms and causes of poverty. Note: If anyone is interested in being a bell-ringer for the Salvation Army's Red Kettle campaign this Christmas season, they may sign up for a time slot at https://registertoring.com/ or call 608-757-8300, ext. 216, at the Janesville office.

MMDC updates -- One of the projects our mission trip members worked on at Midwest Mission was tracing **sewing patterns** for small children's outfits. The patterns are provided to people who want to work on the sewing at home. Pictured are some of the outfits that home sewers can make. We have one package of patterns available to anyone who would like to start sewing. See Diane Gemignani or Ellen Butchart.



Also, we received an email from Midwest Mission that the Home Care Kits (buckets filled with cleaning supplies) that our team filled were sent out on Nov. 3. They were shipped to Guyana through a partnership with Food for the Poor, who provide aid to school children and families internationally. It's great to know exactly when our efforts at the mission go into action!

And finally, a reminder that collection bins for our ongoing support of **Caritas** and **Project 16:49**, as well as the current drive for the **Clinton Food Pantry**, are in the coatroom at the Beloit campus. Caritas is asking for poptop canned soup (other than tomato soup); 16:49 needs toiletries and nutrition bars for teens; our requested donation to the Food Pantry is jello and fruit cocktail.

We will present *Christmas Presence: A Gathering of Hope, Peace, and Love* at 3 p.m. on Saturday, Dec. 4, and 10 a.m. Sunday, Dec. 5, at First Congregational Church, 811 Public St. in Beloit. The Sunday presentation will be in a joint worship service of River of Life and First Congregational.


The cantata is under the direction of our Lois Ulvin, director of music at ROL. There will be an organ prelude by Max Yount, organist and director of music at First Congregational Church. Narration will be done by Rev. Joy Baumgartner and Rev. Gene Van Galder of First Congregational. As always, we have loyal guest singers and former members joining us in the choir. And Lois has secured an ensemble of our longstanding orchestra players, some of whom are making sacrifices to play for us.

It's been two years (Christmas 2019) since we have been able to present a cantata with our expanded choir, orchestra, and piano. In March 2020 we were just two weeks from the date of our Easter cantata when the decision was made to cancel it due to the rising danger of Covid19. It's been a much longer hiatus than we ever expected, but the leadership of both churches have decided that, with Covid safety protocols in place, we can safely return to our joint music tradition this Christmas season.

Audience members will be required to wear masks and social distance. This is a requirement of First Congregational Church, and it has been working very well in their Musica Maxima concert series.

As we return to this beloved tradition, the choir will be feeling the loss of several dear people: our friend, stage usher, and "choir spouse," Paul Dixon; our longtime returning choir member, Lynne Kreisman; and our gifted narrator and singer, Dan Kreisman. Also, with Judy's retirement, it will be the first time in more than three decades that Judy Paddock will not be playing with us. But along with all those who have borne losses, we rejoice that we can come together to celebrate the coming of Christ and of God's peace.

We are excited to come back to this cherished holiday tradition, which many in the church and the community have told us is the start of the real Christmas season for them. We are excited to bring our message of unity and peace, and to bring people together in hope. Come and join us on Dec. 4 and 5 for *Christmas Presence*!

Food cards for homeless students sought

November is National Hunger and Homeless Awareness Month

BELOIT— As more students are being identified as homeless in the School District of Beloit, Beloit Homeless Liaison Coordinator Robin Stuht is calling on the community to donate food cards in light of November being National Hunger and Homeless Awareness Month.

Restaurant gift cards can be helpful for young people who may not have access to a kitchen. Having a gift card to a fast food restaurant not only provides a meal, but can give youth a pleasant place to sit down and study. Gift cards for grocery stores such as Walmart, Aldi's, Piggly Wiggly or Woodman's also can be a great help to hungry families. Gas cards can also assist families as it can help with transportation as well as shelter for those living in vehi-

Gift cards for fast food or groceries can be \$10 to \$20 as every little

bit helps. People may also want to see if they have unused gift cards they have received as gifts that they can share.

As of Nov. 9 Stuht said the School District of Beloit has identified 350 homeless students, defined as not living in fixed, adequate or regular night-time housing.

"That number continues to grow weekly. We have some families living in their vehicles, garages, and basement floors," Stuht said.

Lack of stable housing continues to be a barrier for some students. While the school district can help students obtain food and hygiene items and provide academic and emotional support, it can't solve the problem of unstable housing situ-

ations.

Stuht said more families are risking homelessness as increasing numbers of landlords begin to sell their properties due to the high prices they can get in a booming housing market. Selling the properties is especially attractive to some landlords after they may have not received rent money

during the eviction moratorium.

"Kids are still losing their places due to landlords selling, and ones that are exiting their shelter stays are finding it very difficult to find any affordable or available rentals," Stuht said.

The most common issue students experiencing homelessness face is not knowing from one day to the next where they will be staying at night.

"Some are experiencing anxiety and depression. Many need clothing and access to washing clothing to go to school as they lose their items as they move from place to place," Stuht said.

Stuht said all schools in the district have a care closet. The schools also offer food, hygiene products, school supplies and many other items.

"This is all possible because of a community of caring people that donate gift cards to help our struggling students. What has become difficult for myself and other homeless advocates/ social workers is to go home to a warm place and warm bed knowing some of our students are not afforded that at this time." Stuht said.





Fingerprint Holly Craft

- red finger paint green finger paint
