

This is a picture of my favorite nativity set. I bought it when I was in Bethlehem, Palestine in 2016. It is made from olive tree wood sourced near Bethlehem, and carved by Bethlehem artisans. I chose this particular set because of the palm tree. Yes, there are palm trees in Bethlehem! Snow is actually quite rare in Bethlehem, with the average daily high temperature in December of 56°! This nativity set was very expensive, so I leave it out year-round.

I have a lot of nativity sets. I have small sets and larger sets, and they are made out of various materials. A lot of

my Christmas ornaments are variations of parts or all of the nativity scene. Even my advent calendar is a felt wall hanging where Mary and Joseph move a little closer to Bethlehem each day. Christmas decorations at my house is Jesus' birth.

There are years that I have felt disappointed because I don't get a family Christmas like other people. This year, not only do I have three worship services on Christmas Eve — which doesn't leave time for family — but this year Christmas Day is on a Sunday. I am working Christmas Eve and Christmas Day this year. My clergy daughter will be working the same. And since my husband is also a pastor, I won't even get to be with him during that time. My son doesn't bother. Why would he come when everyone is working?

And yet, as I look at all of my nativity sets, as I sing Christmas carols all night on Christmas Eve and Christmas Sunday morning, I am so blessed to have all of my focus being on the birth of Jesus the Christ. I do want to gather with family, and I will. But during this holy time, I have the blessing of just immersing myself in the holy.

So what are your plans this Christmas Eve and Christmas Day? Most of you will be able to spend some precious time with family. I also hope that you will be able to focus on the birth of Jesus. I hope you will be able to really immerse yourself in the holy. I hope you can spend some time pondering your nativity sets. I hope that you are able to experience the birth of Jesus in a fresh, new way this year.

I'll see you in church, where we worship Christ, our Savior!



The Salvation Army serves "the least of these, our brethren" in the name of Jesus Christ.



Life-giving transformation is needed for growth and healing in our bodies, minds, spirits, and in all of nature, but it does require a healthy environment and good stewardship.1




